9.00 Sunday: Holy Communion (BCP):

This intimate 'said 'service follows the order for Holy Communion from the Book of Common Prayer (1662). For those who like to start their weeks in a quiet, more contemplative setting and those who would like to worship in an historic Anglican way. This service attracts a loyal following plus occasional visitors with attendance between 15-25.

10.30 Sunday: Holy Communion (Common Worship, Monthly All Age Service)

At this, our largest Sunday Service, we enjoy many traditional Anglican hymns, a robed choir, and lectionary readings. People from many different backgrounds, languages and generations gather together to worship, to pray, and to share fellowship. There are children and youth programmes at this service, as well as a time to gather socially afterwards. Attendance is typically 90-120.

14.00 Sunday: Bi-Lingual French/English Holy Communion:

The congregation of this service includes a wide range of nationalities with many people with a heritage in a number of countries in West and East Africa. The service reflects this in joyful style, in lively music and in its use of different languages. There are children and youth programmes at this service. Attendance is typically 40-60.



18.00 Sunday: Contemporary Worship (Monthly Holy Communion):

This service is a vibrant one, experimenting with different structures and styles of prayer, teaching and worship. Also, the community is dynamic, welcoming new arrivals to Brussels and those who have always lived here. Typical attendance 30-50.

12.30 Wednesday: Mid-week Eucharist.

This attracts a small number of local workers, staff based at Holy Trinity and others who are visiting Brussels during the week. Typical attendance 10-15.

Online worship: Our 10.30 and 18.00 services have both Zoom and You-Tube options; 14.00 just YouTube.

These are available live and on demand via our website. The Zoom has the opportunity for on-line fellowship after the service. This attracts homebound people and also some elsewhere in the world who wish to maintain contact with Holy Trinity.



The pro-cathedral of the Holy Trinity, Brussels is a City Centre church, located close to the center of Brussels with excellent public transport links. Our congregation comes from a wide area in the Brussels Region and the surrounding countryside.



English-speaking Anglicans have been meeting in Brussels for worship and fellowship initially in private houses (since 1786) and in regular congregations following the battle of Waterloo (1815). Two purpose built Anglican churches were constructed at the end of the 19th century, and their congregations merged to form Holy Trinity in 1958. The present church building was built at the initiative of the predecessor of the Intercontinental Church Society and opened on Ascension Day 1885.

A major renovation project was completed in the early years of the present millennium. This created new meeting and Sunday School rooms, a user-friendly entrance, a major Church Hall and associated kitchen and provided disabled access. A magnificent new East Window with modern stained glass by Belgian artisans was inaugurated in 2003. A second major building project to renovate Church House (adjacent to the church and halls) was undertaken later, and provided conference rooms, office space for clergy, the Anglican Central Committee and administrative and finance staff, two small apartments and a worship space, named after Edith Cavell.

Brussels

Brussels is a strategically important city. It hosts the European Commission, European Parliament, European Council and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, and many lesser known European and international institutions. It is a strategically important crossroads for diplomacy and plays a key role in international negotiations. The European Council of Ministers, European Parliament and NATO meet here regularly. These activities attract a wide range of associated service industries, trade associations, non-governmental organizations and lobbyists focused on regulatory and government affairs.

Brussels is also the capital of Belgium, location for its key federal government institutions as well as many aspects of its complex and rich political and cultural life. It attracts people from a wide range of countries and cultures. In one recent study the population of the Brussels Capital Region has proportionately more people born elsewhere than any other city in the world, except Dubai.

The congregations of Holy Trinity reflect this wide diversity in our host city.

Brussels provides an agreeable location in many key dimensions.

Healthcare is of a very high quality and readily accessible with a high degree of choice. Education is offered in both French and Dutch language, and includes excellent options for all ages. Public transport connects the city and key locations in the surrounding countryside. Housing is available in the city, suburbs of nearby villages. There is a rich, varied cultural life, with legendary gastronomy (and chocolate!).

Brussels is a city that is used to welcoming newcomers.



All participants in church services participated in a consultation exercise in January 2024 to identify the strengths, challenges and opportunities for Holy Trinity. We invited everyone to give their views on the following questions:

- What do you like about this church?
- Where could our church improve?
- What areas would you like Holy Trinity Brussels to address in the future?
- What characteristics do you look for in the new senior chaplain?

The conclusions of this consultation have been integrated into the Role Description and Person Specification for the new Senior Chaplain.

Clear priorities identified during this consultation were:

- Discipleship and Spiritual Formation. We received feedback
 on the merit of additional focus on teaching, biblical literacy,
 prayer and home groups to equip the congregation in their
 spiritual growth and development.
- Meaningful, thoughtful and stimulating preaching and spiritual leadership.
- Social outreach to the city of Brussels. The extraordinary growth of the Community Kitchen - which now serves 5,000 meals a week to homeless and hungry people in the city encourages us to reflect on what more we can do.
- Evangelism to spread the Gospel message in Brussels and to ensure a wide range of people are invited and welcomed into the life of the church.
- Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. We embrace a wide variety
 of people, and seek a leader who can encourage all we
 welcome to find their place and feel included.

 Children and Youth Work: We have launched Godly Play to appeal to the imagination of young children.

(https://www.godlyplayfoundation.org) We recognize that today's youth often don't see themselves as having a place in the church and we work hard to involve them actively.





- Pastoral care: Our congregation now embraces all ages from infants to elderly people, and we have an increasing number of fragile and vulnerable folk in our congregation. How can we deliver appropriate pastoral care?
- Peace, reconciliation and social justice: We have established a training programme, and are affiliated to the Community of the Cross of Nails. How can we build on this to equip the congregation to make a difference in the world?

- Environmental stewardship: We seek to broaden our understanding of the spiritual foundation of care for creation through teaching and practical initiatives.
- Music ministry: Our consultation showed that our music ministry is seen both as an area of strength and also as an area for improvement. We have a varied music ministry encompassing traditional, contemporary and African styles. What can we do to encourage further creativity and breadth?





The congregation of Holy Trinity has actively embraced the vacancy as a moment to reflect on the current activities and see where we can go next. We highlighted many key strengths to build on:

 Community: The overall spirit in the church is positive, friendly and dynamic. We are a community that offers mutual support through prayer and practical service. We seek to encourage a sense of service and harmony.



 Diversity: Our church embodies key facets of the diversity of the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion especially in terms of nationality, race, background theology and belief. We seek to hold both the gift and the tensions of that diversity well, and provide tangible ways to include people in our ministries.

- Unity: Holy Trinity has remained united, embracing marked differences of theological understanding and cultural differences. We seek to develop better listening, understanding and discussion of difficult issues. We would like to hold more events that bring together the different congregations.
- Spiritual Home: We offer a place to find and build connections and create a community home, especially for people living outside of their home countries. We aim to provide a generous welcome to all, irrespective of age, race, gender, nationality, physical or mental ability, wealth and sexual or gender identity.





- Outreach: The church congregation is changing markedly. We now
 have relatively few people who are exclusively British and count many
 nationalities and backgrounds in our fellowship. We are reaching out
 more into our host city, with vibrant social action and engagement. We
 seek to be an invitational church, which actively seeks out new disciples
 and welcomes them home.
- Environmental awareness: We have secured Bronze Eco Church (https://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk) status and the Council has committed to achieving the Silver level. We are involving the teenagers in presenting this initiative ("Sights on Silver") and seek to link the spiritual and practical aspects of these activities.

- Social Justice: Our various services emphasize different elements
 of our dedication to social justice, equality and social action. We
 seek to find ways to provide a spiritual underpinning to all these
 effort and to learn from each other.
- Peace and Conflict Transformation: We have launched a
 successful training programme developing conflict resolution skills
 and promoting peace (https://centrepourlapaix.be). We regard our
 unusually diverse congregation as an exciting opportunity to develop
 this initiative further, by promoting dialogue between different
 groups.







- Theological diversity: As a church which embraces such a range of Anglican traditions and welcomes congregants from outside the Anglican Communion, we share myriad gifts and their related tensions.
- Volunteers' time: Many of the congregation are busy people, with demanding day jobs and personal commitments. We notice that a small number of key people handle multiple mandates. So, a key priority is encouraging more people to volunteer and contribute.
- **Church fabric**: The core building is almost 140 years' old and its electrics and heating require renovations. We are handling day-to-day maintenance with the current staff. We are aware that preventive maintenance, repair and renewal is required, and aim to do that in an environmentally responsible way.
- Stewardship and finances: We have loyal regular donors and still receive significant plate donations – including by electronic means.
 We are fortunate with various government subsidies. However, our changing demographics mean that we have fewer prosperous members working for international institutions or multinational companies. Fundraising and stewardship are essential.

We look forward to engaging with the new Senior Chaplain to craft a strategic review of the church. Our initial review identified Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats. We seek to build on this exercise, refresh our mission and create a dynamic city center church equipped to serve in our time.
